Likewise, the idea for the coffee-time concerts was met with instant approval and joy at the prospect of the new people that it would attract into our church. This is a man who thinks outside the box and is always open to possibilities.

On a personal level, I have found Norbert an inspiration. One only has to look at his library and at the names which crop up in his sermons to realise that this is a man with a deeper understanding of spirituality than any priest whom I have met before in my life.

The issues with Norbert's voice have been - for us - a huge positive, because one has had to really listen to hear what he's saying, but what he is saying is always so enlightening and inspiring that I have always been glad of the need to really listen. The Covid-19 lockdown periods provided a perfect opportunity for Norbert, as it meant that an audience could really hear him and his messages and go back over the bits that they didn't quite get first time around on-line.

I had the pleasure of sitting with Norbert while he explained to me his vision for the next phase of his life. It was just amazing to see the spirit literally shining out of him as he spoke of his simple plan which could change world hunger for ever.

The world needs more people like Norbert. There is no doubt that we have been truly blessed by having his presence amongst us these past few years, together with Mercy, Steven and Trisa. We shall miss them all, but I believe that the changes through which they have led this parish will be with us for ever.
